In short, mothers with suspected or confirmed COVID-19 infection may room in with their infants and may breastfeed or express breastmilk that can be fed to the infant. Appropriate infection control measures should be followed. It also discusses parents with suspected or confirmed COVID-19 and visiting their infant in the NICU.
